Determine whether the alternating series  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (-1)^n \frac{n}{n^3 + 1}$  is divergent, absolutely convergent, or conditionally convergent.

### $\underline{\text{Problem 1}}$

Determine whether or not each of the following sequences converges. (Give reasons!)

$$a_n = \frac{\ln(n)}{n}$$

$$b_n = \cos(n\pi)$$

$$c_n = \frac{-n}{n+1}$$

## Problem 2

This problem has two separate questions. Answer each question!

(a) Find the numerical value of c for which (the infinite series)

$$\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{1}{(1-c)^{n-1}} = 2.$$

(b) Find the values of x for which the **geometric series** 

$$\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \left( \frac{x-1}{2} \right)^{n-1}$$

converges? Write your answer in interval notation!

# Problem 3

Find the radius and interval of convergence of the power series

$$\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^n}{\sqrt{n}} x^n.$$

Be sure to check any endpoints that exist!

### Problem 4

Answer all the following questions.

(a) Find a power series representation of the function

$$f(x) = \frac{1}{1+x^2},$$

and state the interval on which the series converges to the function.

(Hint: The geometric series might be helpful here!)

(b) Use the series in (a) to find a power series representation of the function

$$g(x) = \frac{x^3}{1 + x^2}.$$

#### Problem 5

Answer all the following questions.

(a) Find the Maclaurin series representation of the function  $f(x) = e^{-x^2}$ . (Hint: You may use the Maclaurin series of  $e^x$  if need be!)

(b) Use the series in (a) to evaluate the integral

$$\int e^{-x^2} \, dx$$

as a power series.

(c) Use the series in (b) to write out the Maclaurin series representation of

$$\int_0^{1/10} e^{-x^2} \, dx$$

(Do not compute and add the terms of your series!)

(d) How many terms do you need in the series in (c) to approximate  $\int_0^{1/10} e^{-x^2} dx$  with an error less than  $10^{-6}$ ? (Show your work!)

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
