biscuits, and hams.


I'm thankful for pumpkins.

### Following the Child's Lead

Let the child choose a book or toy.

- Infants and toddlers let you know if they want to look at a particular book or toy.
- Preschoolers often have favorites that they want read or play with over and over.

Allow a baby to chew on a book or toy if she wants.

• Talk about how it tastes and feels.

Let the child turn the pages of a book if he wants.

- If he turns three or four pages at a time, talk about what comes up on the pages you see.
- Preschoolers usually can turn one page at a time, but it is all right if they also turn several pages at a time. Talk about what's on the page you're looking at and occasionally ask what might be on the next page.


Let the child decide when she is finished.

• Move on when she is ready.

Build on the child's interests.

- Introduce new books or toys that he is interested in.
- If he shows particular interest in a certain picture, toy, or part of the story, spend more time talking about it.





### Following the Child's Lead When Reading with Infants, Toddlers, and Preschoolers

### Example 1

### Place one to three books in front of an infant.

Adult: Carefully follow what the baby looks at, reaches for, or otherwise appears interested in.

Choose that book and look at it and talk about it with the baby.

### Example 2

While looking at a book, the infant wants to take the plastic-covered book from the adult's hand and mouth the book.

Adult: Give the book to her and say, "Oh, you want to eat the book instead. Does it taste good?"

### Example 3

An adult is reading and talking with a toddler. He sees another child with a ball. The toddler moves to get the ball.

Adult: Say, "Are we finished reading now? Shall we stop and go play ball?"

### Example 4

While reading to a young toddler, she wants to turn the pages backward instead of forward.

Adult: Say, "Oh, you want to turn the pages that way. Look, there's that doggie again."

### Example 5

An adult observes a child tracing her finger over the drawings in Harold and the Purple Crayon or sees a preschooler putting hats on his head.

Adult: Say, "You're looking at the pictures Harold drew. Would you like to draw some pictures, too? What do you need?"

Adult: Say, "You look like the peddler in *Caps for Sale*. What else do we need to act out the story?"

### THE FIVE TOP TOY HAZARDS

- Scooters and other Riding Toys Riding toys, skateboards and in-line skates go fast and falls could be deadly. Helmets and safety gear should be worn at all times and be sized to fit.
- Small Balls and other Toys with Small Parts For children younger than age three, avoid toys with small parts, which can cause choking.
- Balloons Children under eight yrs. can choke or suffocate on un-inflated or broken balloons. Keep un-inflated balloons from children. Discard broken balloons at once.
- Magnets For children under age six, avoid building or play sets with small magnets. If magnets or pieces with magnets are swallowed, serious injuries and/or death can occur.
- Chargers and Adapters Charging batteries should be supervised by adults. Chargers and adapters can pose thermal burn hazards to children.

### Once the gifts are open:

- Immediately discard plastic wrappings on toys before they become dangerous play things.
- Keep toys appropriate for older children away from younger siblings.
- Pay attention to instructions and warnings on battery chargers. Some chargers lack any device to prevent overcharging.


### Sweet Potato and Apple Soup

### **Recipe By: Mory Thomas**

#### Ingredients

- 1 3/4 pound(s) sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into 1-inch dice
- 1 small parsnip, peeled and cut into 1-inch dice
- 2 garlic cloves, coarsely chopped
- 2 tablespoon(s) extra-virgin olive oil
- salt to taste
- 6.cup(s) vegetable stock or low-sodium broth
- 1 dash(es) apple cider
- 1 teaspoon(s) green Tabasco sauce
- finely diced Granny Smith apple and minced parsley, for garnish

#### **Directions**



In a blender, puree half of the vegetables with 3 cups of the stock; transfer to a large saucepan. Repeat with the remaining vegetables and stock. Add the apple cider and Tabasco and heat through. Season with salt. Serve with the diced apple and minced parsley

### **Christmas Candy**

1 pound (468 gms) white chocolate

1 cup small pretzels, broken into small pieces

1 cup pecans, chopped
