# DEAN'S MESSAGE

### Strength in numbers

Have you ever tried to tear a phone book in half? Individually, the pages rip easily. But the more pages you put together the harder it is to tear them in two. I remember demonstrating an old eighth grade science experiment to my son a few years ago. We interlaced the pages of two phone books to reveal how, collectively, the pages are so strong the books can't be pulled apart – not even in a good old-fashioned tug of war.

# FACULTY HIGHLIGHTS

Dr. James C. Broome, Professor of Restorative Sciences, has been named Division Head of General Dentistry. In his new role, Dr. Broome will oversee the Comprehensive Care Clinic, Limited Care & Treatment Planning Clinic, D1 Pre-clinical Dentistry, Operative Dentistry, and many other courses taught within the Division of General Dentistry.

Dr. Mia Geisinger, Associate Professor of Periodontology, has been appointed Program Director for the Advanced Education Program in Periodontology. She will be the first woman to serve in this role, and the eighth director of the program. Before joining our faculty in 2007, Mia received her dental degree from Columbia University School of Dental Medicine and completed her advanced training in periodontology, in addition to an MS in clinical dentistry, at UTHSC San Antonio. She has served as the pre-doctoral periodontal program director since 2008 and during this time has been an integral part of the advanced training program.

Dr. Wen-Chou "James" Wu, Assistant Professor in the Division of Prosthodontics, has become board certified by the American Board of Prosthodontics, earning the title of diplomate. James was recognized in October 2015 during the annual session of the American College of Prosthodontists in Orlando, FL where he become a Fellow of the college.

Dr. Chin-Chuan Fu, Assistant Professor in the Division of Prosthodontics, has become board certified by the American Board of Prosthodontics. She will be recognized at the annual session of the American College of Prosthodontists in San Diego, CA in 2016 where she will be inducted as a Fellow into the college.

Dr. Fu also received the UAB Faculty Development Grant to study the clinical effects of short-term aging in full-contour zirconia crowns.

Dr. Nathanial Lawson, Assistant Professor in the Division of Biomaterials, received the American Academy of Esthetic Dentistry Research Grant to study the fracture strength of zirconia crowns following artificial aging.

Dr. Lillian Mitchell, Assistant Professor and Director of Geriatric Dentistry in the Division of Behavioral and Population Sciences, received a Dental Trade Alliance Foundation grant to support the program at the UAB/Fair Haven Oral Health Center that trains the UAB internal medicine interns and residents in oral health. Now Dr. Mitchell will be able to develop and use a didactic program to go along with the clinical training, which will truly exhibit an inter-professional effort between dentistry and medicine. In addition, Dr. Mitchell completed her Master of Arts degree in Education with a concentration in Dental Education in September 2015 from the University of the Pacific, Benerd School of Education in San Francisco, California.

Mitra Adhami (D3) finished her PhD in Cell Biology in 2014 under her mentor Dr. Amjad Javed through the UAB DMD/PhD program. Mitra started the DMD/PhD program in 2009 and, as part of the dual degree program, was able to submit an F30 grant to the NIH/NIDCR, which helps pay tuition and living expenses. In her educational career thus far, she has had 22 abstracts selected for presentation at various conferences, and five peer-reviewed articles accepted, three of which were first-author publications. Currently, Mitra is the president of the National Student Research Group (NSRG), who is responsible for hosting student events and socials as well as a hands-on-workshop and student symposium at the AADR conference in March 2016, and has served on the Board of the AADR since 2014.

> Bright Chang (D1) and Suruchi Lamba (MS in Clinical Dentistry) both received 2015 Ronald Goldstein Foundation Research Grants. The grants were received from Dr. Ronald Goldstein of Atlanta, GA through a research foundation established through Alpha Omega Dental Society. Bright's project will explore the stability of silane used for e.max restorations. Suruchi's project will examine the microleakage around composite restorations exposed to ultrasonic scaling and toothbrushing. The results of the project will be submitted for presentation at the 2016 annual session of the American Association of Dental Research in Los Angeles, CA.

Angi Gullard (D4) was accepted into the Advanced Prosthodontics Program and Master of Dental Science Program at the University of Tennessee Health Science Center at Memphis. With two residents accepted each year, Angi will be part of the first all-female class of residents at UTHSC, starting on July 1, 2016. In addition, Angi defended her PhD dissertation in October 2015. The title is "Functional Role of MEPE in Tooth Mineralization: Mediation by TGF-beta1." This will be the culmination of her research experience in the eight-year DMD/PhD program at UAB. Angi has also submitted two manuscripts for publication, with a third one being completed, from her dissertation research: 1) "Reduced dentin matrix protein expression in Camurati-Engelmann Disease transgenic mouse model" to the Journal of Cellular Physiology and 2) "Mepe Deletion Fails to Disrupt Dentin Synthesis" to the Journal of Histochemistry and Cytochemistry.

5. Michael Vaughan (D3) has completed an original research project under the direction of Dr. Chung H. Kau and the results have been accepted for publication in The Journal of Craniofacial Surgery. Michael has presented his research at UAB's Scholar's Symposium, the IADR General Session in Boston, and the AAO Annual Session in San Francisco. Anatomage, whose software was used in the research, also included Michael's study on its website (http://dental.anatomage.com/ dentalgallery). When asked about his experience, Michael explained, "Dr. Kau has been a wonderful mentor and resource for this project. I'm also grateful for UAB's 'Dean's Travel Award' which allowed me to travel to Boston to present my research. I have developed enormous respect for those who dedicate their life to advance our knowledge by producing original research."

Janet Kim (D4) has been selected to serve a one-year appointment as representative for the "Southeast A" region of the National Student Research Group (NSRG). As a regional leader she will work to encourage networking and collaboration among student chapters, bridge communication between NSRG's local and national levels, and engage student chapters in NSRG initiatives.

### D2 Students Create Custom Mouthguards for Local Football Team

Dr. Kevin Alexander ('89) and Dr. Ruth Penton Polson ('02) recruited a group of D2 students to make custom mouthguards for the Mountain Brook varsity football team as a community service effort and to help promote their practice, Over the Mountain Dentistry, in Mountain Brook Village. Over the course of the D2 summer break, these students arrived before football practice, as early as 5:45am, to consult with the players and take impressions. And, the majority of the lab work was facilitated solely by the students. The result was 125 custom mouth guards that will be used for the 2015 football season and great hands-on, clinical experience for several aspiring dentists!





### **3rd Annual UAB Dentistry Cares Day**

On October 21, 2015, UAB Dentistry Cares Community Day volunteers provided urgent dental care to low income and homeless adults and offered a platform for UAB faculty, staff, students, alumni, and friends to join forces with the community in service to people in need. Throughout the day, UAB's School of Dentistry served a total of 470 patients. With the help from two other event sites – Christ Health Center and The Foundry – a total of 550 patients were allowed access to dental care in the form of cleanings, extractions or fillings.



Dr. Conan Davis, Assistant Dean for Community Collaborations and Public Health and Chair of UAB Dentistry Cares, said the event not only provides

dental care for adults in need - it also raises awareness of the lack of resources for low-income adults.



"Although there are a handful of clinics that provide low-cost dental care, there are not enough resources for adults who can't afford dental care," Davis said. "We know there are associations between things like periodontal disease and heart disease," Davis said. "It can impact health in a lot of ways."

More than half of adults ages 20 to 64 below the federal poverty level report their teeth are either in "fair" or "poor" condition, according to the National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research. Less than 50 percent of these adults see a dentist regularly. Additionally, Alabama is one of just six states that

provides no dental coverage for adults on Medicaid, according to the National Academy for State Health Policy, so low-income people have limited access to dental services in this state.

The event grows bigger each year, with more partners and sponsors and a growing number of patients. The School of Dentistry's 2015 community partners and supporters included the Christ Health Center, The Foundry, Fortis School of Dental Hygiene, Cahaba Valley Health Care, The Alabama Dental Association and the Birmingham District Dental Society, Sarrell Dental and sponsors like the BlueCross BlueShield of Alabama Caring Foundation, Brasseler and Henry Schein. The UAB School of Dentistry is among very few dental schools in the country to host this type of benevolent event. Along with dental care, all participating patients received oral health counseling, blood pressure checks, and oral cancer screenings. The event helps raise awareness of the increasing difficulty low-income adults face in accessing critical dental care and challenges dental professionals to work together to improve the oral health of the citizens of Alabama and beyond – a mission we are passionate about at UAB Dentistry.







# FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CHARTING FOR SUCCESS

Coaches of most sports make decisions and call plays based on percentages and the success charts they painstakingly compile and analyze each week. Since we are located in the football capital of the universe, I will use football as an example. Tom Landry, the famous Dallas Cowboys coach, was a master of charting his and other team's tendencies. Based on the percentage of the best outcome, he more often than not had the winning offensive or defensive game plan. Landry had twenty consecutive winning seasons as an NFL coach, a record that still stands.

As a Landry assistant, Gene Stallings learned to chart success rates. Stallings relied on playing the percentages to guide Alabama to the 1992 national championship. Of course, it takes great leadership and talent to win at the highest level. Nowadays, there are standards for how tall, how fast, or how big players should be to excel at the highest level of competition.



We can also chart the success of the UAB School of Dentistry and the Alumni Association. Our students have had a 100 percent pass rate on national exams the past several years. The students have a greater success rate on these exams because (1) when they enroll at UAB, they have stellar aptitude and grades, (2) the School has the most rigorous clinical requirements of any dental school, and (3) they learn from some of the best clinicians and researchers in dentistry.

For the past several years, 45 to 50 percent of our alumni have been members of the UASOD Alumni Association. Just a few years ago, the Alumni Association began offering membership to third and fourth year students. As we have seen student-alumni relationships strengthen, we can also predict that more young alumni will become more involved with the School and the Alumni Association. Alumni giving can also increase our success rate. Approximately 15 percent of our alumni make an annual financial contribution to the School. These gifts allow us to enhance the physical facilities, recruit and retain a high caliber faculty, enrich student experiences, and improve the services and care we provide. If a school has all these attributes, the success rate increases. Doesn't it stand to reason the School will have an even higher success rate if more alumni are involved and more alumni make financial contributions?

You may have noticed increased contact from the School and the Alumni Association. Whether it's a personal visit, mailings, social media, or phone calls, we have increased our efforts to reach our alumni. We ask for your support financially and otherwise. For fiscal year 2015 (ending September 30, 2015), we raised \$3,970,847, taking our comprehensive campaign total to \$16,385,088. These figures broke our previous fundraising records. We were fortunate to receive significant major and planned gifts, but the percentage of first time donors, young alumni, and even students helped us break these records.

Of course, there are other factors that account for a person's or team's success. Strong leadership, a positive attitude, and just plain luck come to mind. There's no doubt the UAB School of Dentistry and your Alumni Association are charted for success.

# Carestream Dental Donates CBCT System in Honor of Dr. David Sarver

Carestream Dental recently donated a CS 9300C system in honor of well-known orthodontist David Sarver, D.M.D., M.S. "We are deeply appreciative of Carestream Dental's gift in honor of Dr. David Sarver, a UAB School of Dentistry alumnus," said Dr. Michael Reddy, Dean, UAB School of Dentistry. "Staying at the forefront of technological advances is one of the School's highest strategic priorities."

The donation comes as part of a lifetime achievement award given to Sarver in recognition of almost twenty years consulting for Carestream Dental. During that time, he played an important role in designing and developing CS Orthodontic Imaging software. Sarver is also the designer of the Sarver Analysis Module for CS Orthodontic Imaging and CS OrthoTrac practice management software. In honor of his dedication to advancing the specialty of orthodontics, Carestream Dental donated the CS 9300C to the university of his choosing.



"I served at UAB as a clinical associate professor for 15 years and worked closely with many teachers at the university," Sarver said. "I appreciate their dedication to both their students and the dental profession. I owe them a real debt personally and it was a simple choice for me to designate UAB as the recipient of Carestream Dental's very generous gift."

The CS 9300C is a four-in-one system that features panoramic, CBCT and the cephalometric imaging that is so vital to orthodontics, as well as the ability to scan PVS impressions and stone models. Students can familiarize themselves with seven selectable fields of view, from single/dual jaw to maxillofacial options. They can also practice the ALARA (As Low as Reasonably Achievable) principle with Low Dose and Fast Scan modes, which are particularly beneficial to the young patients the students will one day be treating.

"Carestream Dental and Dr. David Sarver are synonymous in digital dentistry innovations," Chung How Kau, Ph.D., chairman of the UAB School of Dentistry Department of Orthodontics, said. "This gift in his honor not only will benefit the UAB Dentistry Department of Orthodontics but all of our residency programs and our D.M.D. students."

Sarver compares the value of CBCT to that of keeping an eyeglass prescription up-to-date. Much like how putting on a new pair of glasses brings things that were once blurry into sharp focus, a CBCT scan provides "greater acuity to diagnostic vision."

"Trying to visualize the location of impacted teeth or whether pathology is present has suddenly come into focus, as though—prior to this technology—I needed glasses but didn't know it," Sarver said.

Sarver received his Doctorate of Dental Medicine from UAB School of Dentistry in 1977 and his Master of Science in Orthodontics from the University of North Carolina. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Orthodontics; a member of the Edwards H. Angle Society of Orthodontists; a Fellow of both the International and American Colleges of Dentists; and a Fellow in the American Association of Esthetic Dentists. Sarver also co-authored the fourth and fifth editions of "Contemporary Orthodontics," the most widely used orthodontic text in the world. He currently practices in Vestavia Hills, Ala., outside of Birmingham.

# **Endowed Professorship Established in School of Dentistry**

### Thanks to generous donations since 2008, an endowed support fund becomes a professorship.

In 2008, friends and supporters came together to create the Dr. Tommy Weatherford/Dr. Kent Palcanis Endowed Support Fund in hopes that the fund would eventually become an endowed professorship. Thanks to initial funding of nearly \$80,000 and additional gifts over the years that total more than \$420,000, the project reached the minimum needed to create the Dr. Tommy Weatherford/ Dr. Kent Palcanis Endowed Professorship in Dentistry. The new professorship was approved by the University of Alabama Board of Trustees, and will serve as a vital tool in recruiting the best and brightest to the School of Dentistry and supporting the work of the holder of the endowment.



"I think there have been donations from alumni from every decade from the 1960s to the current one," said Tommy Weatherford, D.V.M., D.M.D. "It's pleasing that people would donate who have been away so long. They are scattered across the country. A few have been international."

Michael S. Reddy, D.M.D., D.M.Sc., dean of the School of Dentistry, said endowments are a vital resource for helping provide teaching, research and service. "Robust endowments are essential to preserving the future of our program and facilities, and these gifts will serve our school well for generations to come," he said.

Weatherford, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Periodontology, served as director of advanced dental education programs from 1970 to 1984. He also led the Advanced Education Program in Periodontics from 1976 to 1996. He received the Moren Fuller Award in 2003 from the University of Alabama School of Dentistry Alumni Association. He also is the 2005 recipient of the American Academy of Periodontology's Outstanding Periodontal Educator Award and the 2006 recipient of the Alabama Dental Association's Most Excellent Fellow Award for outstanding service and commitment to the dental profession.

"I was particularly pleased to have my name connected with Kent because he's an outstanding guy, the epitome of what a healthcare professional and a good friend should be," Weatherford said.

Kent Palcanis, D.D.S., is Professor Emeritus in the Department of Periodontology and former Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. He developed the first-year course that is still used for today's dental students. He served as president of the Alabama Dental Association from 2006 to 2007, and he has lectured nationally and internationally. He is the recipient of the Clinical Research Award in Periodontology, Special Citation, and Presidential and Fellowship awards from the American Academy of Periodontology, and he also was named a Most Excellent Fellow by the Alabama Dental Association. Palcanis received the 2014 Outstanding Periodontal Educator Award from the American Academy of Periodontology.

Weatherford has watched the progress of both the School of Dentistry and UAB over the years and said he's happy that the professorship will help sustain continued growth. "When I came here as a freshman in 1957, Birmingham was a steel industry town," he said. "The School of Dentistry was not air-conditioned so the windows were open, and I can remember soot seeping in under the windows.

"Those early leaders had a broad vision that they were going to do something really great and it was fun to be around as a student. I really think this professorship will help patients and students, residents, and researchers, and it is in line with what the school wants to do. What helps the School of Dentistry helps UAB."

**Dr. Staci N. Gaffos ('64)** has come a long way. Born in Elizabeth City, North Carolina to Nicholas and Jeanette Gaffos, his family moved to Camden, South Carolina where his father, a first generation immigrant from Greece, opened a restaurant. "I received a lot of valuable lessons about a work ethic" Dr. Gaffos explains. "I learned how to meet the public and talk to people. That really helped me in college, dental school and private practice".

Growing up, Dr. Gaffos remembers visiting a local dentist who did not use novocaine. When he went back to Greece to visit his grandmother, he visited a dentist that used a foot pedal drill. He laughed and said "I'm probably one of a few Americans who have been treated with that type of drill!" When he got back to the states he went to a young dentist, Dr. David Joseph, who used novocaine and was painless. This inspired him to become a dentist.

He attended the University of South Carolina where he was a cheerleader, Sigma Nu and in Who's Who. He was president of the YMCA and was sent to New York City on a six week leadership conference and his group met Eleanor Roosevelt and the mayor of New York. "Those experiences really made an impression on me" Dr. Gaffos said. I wanted to reach for more and growing up I saw how the loss of teeth really affected someone. I wanted to do what I could to prevent that from happening".

Since South Carolina had no dental school at the time, he was fortunate to be one of two students accepted by the University of Alabama School of Dentistry. " Dr. Joe Volker was the Dean and he and the faculty wanted to make sure they gave us the best dental education possible. Dr. Scotty McCallum was our instructor in oral surgery and his orals were tough! The faculty had a great sense of humor and that made it fun."

After graduation, he went into the military as Captain and was stationed in Japan at 249th General Hospital. "I really enjoyed my time there," he says. "I met a lot of great friends there whom I'm still in touch with today."

While in the Army he took up skiing in the Japanese Alps and became the U.S. Army Japan Tennis Champion. He kept playing competively after leaving the service and won the National Dentist Tennis Tournament in Miami in 1973, 1974 and 1975.

After serving in the military, Dr. Gaffos returned to his private practice in Columbia, S.C. "Being a dentist is the best career you could want," Dr. Gaffos said with obvious pride. If you join a corporation you work for thirty years, beat out one million people, and become C.E.O. The day you start practice you are a C.E.O. When you become competent it gives you confidence. I have been practicing for 51 years and I still love coming to work every day. I love caring for people and in return they hold you in high esteem. In addition, Dr. Gaffos feels it is important to give back to his schools and profession. "Both have given me a life that I love and I want to repay both in any way I can."

Dr. Gaffos has been president of four local and regional dental societies and two state organizations including the Pierre Fauchard Academy. He was elected president of the American Academy of the History of Dentistry in Vienna, Austria and was recently the recipient of its highest award, the Hayden Harris Award.

He is a fellow in the American College of Dentists and the Academy of Dentistry International. He volunteered in the Children's Dental Clinic in Columbia for 25 years and Give Back a Smile in the American Academy of Cosmetic Dentistry.

He has traveled worldwide visiting over fifty countries and forty states. He is a real estate investor and creator of the Dr. Staci Gaffos Museum of Dental History in Columbia, SC. With all of his professional success he is most proud of his three children Katherine, Electra and Nicholas and his four grandchildren! He is most appreciative of the fine education he received at the University of Alabama School of Dentistry.

### ALDA and SOD Award 2015 HRSA Grants to Three Alabama Dentists

The 2015 Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Grant Recipients are Drs. Emily Simpson Carter, Michael Miller and Jordan Taylor.

HRSA is the primary federal agency for improving access to health care services for people who are uninsured, isolated, or medically vulnerable. The HRSA grants given to dentists in Alabama are jointly administered by the University of Alabama School of Dentistry and the Alabama Dental Association under the Alabama Dental Workforce Enhancement Program (ADWEP). These grants are given to dentists in an effort to increase dental access for underserved Alabamians. One of the stipulations of the grant is that the applicant agrees to maintain a minimum of 30% Medicaid recipients in their total patient population.



**Emily Simpson Carter ('15)**, a native of Fyffe, located on Sand Mountain in Northeast Alabama, earned a BS in Biomedical Science from Auburn University in 2011. When asked what the HRSA grant will mean to her practice, Dr. Carter stated, "With the ever increasing cost of education, I along with most of my colleagues graduated with a large amount of student debt. That debt for a lot of people factors into what job opportunities they are able to pursue. It has made some ventures cost prohibitive. The grant has afforded me the chance to go

back to the area where I grew up and the grant allows me to help meet the need of the underserved Medicaid population in the area. Over the past few months, I have been an associate at a practice that sees a large number of Medicaid patients. We are adding more chairs to allow us to see even more of these patients. Without the grant, none of this would be possible. I am very grateful for the grant and honored that I was selected." Dr. Carter practices pediatric dentistry in Rainsville.




