

Graduate Certificate in Teaching English as an Additional Language

Fully Online Program

The Graduate Certificate in Teaching English as an Additional Language (TEAL) will prepare you for effectively teaching English to adults in diverse settings locally and abroad. Such teaching contexts include language institutes, cultural associations, community centers, faith-based entities, and workplace classes. By pursuing this certificate, you will develop theory and pedagogy for meeting linguistic and sociocultural needs of adults who wish to improve their English for personal reasons, work needs, and/or academic purposes. By pursuing this TEAL certificate, you can also support your own professional development for career enhancement and leadership advancement.

Coursework

TEAL has online courses to serve you and others throughout Alabama, in other states, and around the world. This TEAL certificate consists of five courses (EESL 625, EESL 627, EESL 637, EESL 677, EESL 687) for a total of 15 credit hours. Also required is EESL 007 (zero credit hours), which are weekly teaching experiences that culminate in a practicum during the final semester. This certificate can be pursued while working full-time or while enrolled in a degree program.

The TEAL certificate is designed to deepen and broaden knowledge and skills for teaching English to adults. This expertise is needed in multiple settings where increasing numbers of adults seek to improve their English in order to qualify for new employment opportunities and, in turn, raise their quality of life. To help adults reach these goals, consider pursuing the TEAL. Here, you will

- learn theories about how adults learn new languages and then apply these theories in the teaching of English to adult learners.
- plan, use, and evaluate diverse instructional methods, strategies, and techniques for diverse types of adult learners such as long-term English users, migrant workers, and internationally contracted workforce groups, as well as immigrants, refugees, and asylees.
- diagnose learners' English proficiency and design and deliver instruction to improve communication skills focused on speaking English at a highly comprehensible level.
- develop and implement an individualized curriculum based on adult ESL standards that focus on a specific purpose or context (e.g., workplace setting).
- expand and finetune instructional techniques by teaching English classes weekly for three (or more) semesters and receiving regular, sequenced feedback from SOE mentors, initially in the UAB Community English Program and later in workplace settings.

Admission Requirements

Admission eligibility is based on having an undergraduate degree in any major from a regionally accredited institution with an overall GPA of 2.5 (or be approaching completion of a degree). *Please note that most applicants do NOT have a degree in education.* Register for a Zoom information session by emailing jprado@uab.edu or spezzini@uab.edu. Using TEAL toward a Master's Degree

You can use all five TEAL courses toward a master's degree. If you wish to earn an ESL master's, submit a degree-seeking application to the MAEd/ESL program's TESOL track and then take six additional ESL courses. If you wish to earn an interdisciplinary master's, submit a degree-seeking application to UAB's Graduate School and stack your TEAL certificate with another UAB certificate (e.g., special education, higher education administration, health coaching, public management).

Plan of Study

Required Courses: The TEAL certificate requires four content courses (EESL 625, EESL 627, EESL 637, EESL 687) and a practicum course (EESL 677). Each of these courses consists of three credit hours for a total of 15 credit hours. TEAL also requires EESL 007, which is a 0-hour experiential learning course taken each semester.

Course Rotation: EESL 637 and EESL 687 take place in the Fall semester, EESL 625 in Spring, and EESL 627 in Summer. As the culminating practicum, EESL 677 occurs during a student's final semester (Fall, Spring, or Summer). To prepare for their practicum, students take a 0-hour experiential learning course (EESL 007) each semester.

Program Timeline: Students can start in fall, spring, or summer. Based on their start date, students follow a three-semester program timeline (see below). They participate weekly in experiential learning (*italicized*) each semester and, by doing so, put into practice what they are learning through their coursework. They do a practicum in their final semester.
