He was reappointed to the Board in 2004 and served until 2007.

Community activities have included Leadership Alabama Class II, the Board of Directors for Chambers County/Bradshaw Library, the Board of Trustees for Lanier Health Services and Chattahooches Valley Healthard countation, the Sterring Committee for the Greater Valley Area Chamber of Commerce's Project Leadership, and the Executive Committee of the National Physician's Center for Family Resources.

Dr. Mullins and his wife, Jeannene, have three children and nine grandchildren. His interests include bioethics and classical music.


