Dr. Natalie Hernandez is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Community Health and Preventive Medicine and the Assistant Director of the Office of Community Engagement at Morehouse School of Medicine. Dr. Hernandez has a broad background in community-based participatory research (CBPR), cancer prevention, sexual and reproductive health disparities, health policy, and social determinants of health. She has more than 12 years of experience in developing community partnerships and implementing CBPR that engages with diverse stakeholder groups. She also has expertise in qualitative design and experience in conducting rigorous, robust qualitative research using a broad array of research methods (including focus groups, in-depth interviews, case studies, ethnography, observation, and document review). In 2006, She was the co-Principal Investigator of a study entitled, "Psychosocial and socio-cultural correlates of the human papillomavirus vaccine uptake and intentions among ethnoracial minority students". This study examined ethnoracial minority male and female college students' current knowledge, attitudes, behaviors and cultural factors that promoted or inhibited HPV vaccine acceptability. She currently serves as the PI on two studies related to sexual health equity: one is examining cultural, economic, social, structural, and policy factors contributing to high rates of unintended pregnancy among low income black and Latina women in Atlanta; the second is a CBPR needs assessment examining sexual and reproductive health facilitators and barriers in a low-income Atlanta community. Prior to academia, Dr. Hernandez held leadership positions in a number of coalitions in Georgia dedicated to advancing health equity. She has successfully managed and administered the projects (e.g. staffing, research protections, budget), collaborated with other researchers, and produced peer-reviewed publications as well as conference presentations.

Dr. Kumar started his journey in Tumor Immunology with a unique tumor model Dalton's lymphoma (Non-Hodgkin lymphoma, NHL). In the human population, NHL frequency is such that it accounts 70% cases among different type of lymphoma in the USA. In this context, Dalton's lymphoma (DL) is unique murine tumor model to study anti-cancer molecular mechanism(s) involved in lymphoma growth. One of the mechanisms that DL cells adapt is a high level of heat shock proteins (HSP). During his PhD, he worked on the topic entitled "Molecular Mechanism of Protein Kinase C Inhibition on the Expression of hsp70 and Apoptotic Factors in a Murine T cell Lymphoma (Dalton's Lymphoma)". His PhD work has been published in several international journals of high repute.

At Alabama State University, Dr. Kumar is working under the supervision of Dr. Manoj Mishra. His main focus is investigation of the role of immune cells in prostate cancer progression and clearance. Dr. Kumar is also involved in the elucidation of the role polymeric scaffold in bone tissue regeneration and role of dietary compounds in prostate cancer therapy. Dr. Kumar also trains graduate, undergraduate and high school students during academic year in cancer research.
